Draw the story of Mother's Day and revisit what happened.

Helps Your Child Grow



Sense of Identity and Belonging

Remembering, telling, and drawing a shared family experience helps your child revisit the love and connection within that event.



Writing

Writing "Mom," "Dad," or their own name gives your child experience using print to record important people and events.

Steps

- After Mother's Day, use paper and markers to record a few warm or funny moments together.
- Begin by remembering the day: "What gift did we prepare for Mom?"
- Invite your child to draw the events like a simple comic - for example, choosing flowers, giving them to Mom, and seeing her hold them happily.
- Ask for details your child can add: "What color were the flowers? What did Mom's face look like when she received them?"
- If the picture shows only your child and Mom, Dad can smile and say, "I was there too. What did I bring?" and add to the drawing with them.
- At the end, help your child label each family member with "Mom," "Dad," and their own name.

Tips

- When your child draws a person, encourage details such as distinctive features and facial expressions to make the picture richer.
